Communications resource kit to promote 2026 registration and enrolment

For local councils offering Threeand Four-Year-Old Kindergarten, and Pre-Prep for priority cohort children











Introduction

All Victorian children can now experience the benefits of 2 years of quality play-based learning. For some families, this includes Pre-Prep. It is important that families are supported to understand what their children can access and how they can register and enrol.

2026 snapshot

- From 2026, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from a refugee or asylum seeker background, and children who have had contact with Child Protection have statewide access to Pre-Prep.
- Any child who was supported by Early Start Kindergarten or Access to Early Learning in their Three-Year-Old Kindergarten year is also eligible for Pre-Prep from 2026.
- A further 12 local government areas (LGAs) will start to deliver **Pre-Prep**, following a successful launch in 6 LGAs this year.
- **Three-Year-Old Kindergarten** will move another year closer to full implementation.
- Free Kinder continues.



How to use this communications resource kit

This communications resource kit is for all local councils in Victoria, except those in 2025 and 2026 geographic Pre-Prep roll-out areas.

- This resource kit is intended to support local councils with the 2026 registration and enrolment period.
- The content can be used in council newsletters, websites and on social media. The kit may also help you respond to questions from families about the Best Start, Best Life reforms and Pre-Prep.
- It can be used by all local councils, including those that operate a Central Registration and Enrolment Scheme (CRES) and those that do not.

Enrol your child in kinder for next year

It is time to enrol your children in kindergarten for 2026.

Services in **<insert council name>** will be offering up to 15 hours of Three-Year-Old Kindergarten each week, and 15 hours of Four-Year-Old Kindergarten each week.

Free Kinder will continue to be available at participating standalone kindergartens and long day care centres.

Pre-Prep will be available for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from a refugee or asylum seeker background and children who have had contact with Child Protection across the state, including **<insert LGA>.** Any child who was supported by Early Start Kindergarten or Access to Early Learning in their Three-Year-Old Kindergarten year is also eligible for Pre-Prep from 2026. Pre-Prep hours will range from 16 to 25 hours each week for children who meet this eligibility criteria. Eligible families are encouraged to contact their local services or the council for more information.

It's strongly recommended children go to kindergarten for 2 years before starting school. Studies show this often leads to better development in language, pre-reading, early number concepts, independence and social skills.

Pre-Prep will start for all 4-year-olds in **<insert council name>** in **<insert year>**.

More hours, more learning, more play



Is your child eligible for Pre-Prep in 2026?

Pre-Prep starts next year across Victoria for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from a refugee or asylum seeker background, children who have had contact with Child Protection, or any child accessing Early Start Kindergarten or Access to Early Learning in 2025.

Services in **<local council>** will be offering Pre-Prep to eligible children from next year.

Use the Pre-Prep calculator at <u>vic.gov.au/preprep</u> to see if your child is eligible.

• Free interpreting services

Remember, if your local council delivers a Central Registration and Enrolment Scheme and/or a program to support kindergarten and Pre-Prep access and participation such as the CALD Outreach Initiative, you are also eligible to access free <u>interpreting services</u>.

Free Kinder

- Free Kinder is available at participating services for Three- and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten programs, and Pre-Prep in 2026.
- Free Kinder is for everyone you don't need to be a permanent resident or Australian citizen to access a free kindergarten program.
- Free Kinder can only be accessed at one service at a time.
- Families with children enrolled in a participating standalone (sessional) kinder receive a free program.
- Families with children enrolled in a participating long day care receive a fee offset.
 - If families are eligible for the <u>Commonwealth Childcare Subsidy (CCS)</u>, this will be applied first and then the Free Kinder offset. This means families only need to pay the remaining amount after CCS and the Free Kinder offset have been applied.
- Services offering Free Kinder receive funding directly from the Victorian Government. This means families don't have to claim the savings back.

Three-Year-Old Kindergarten

- Three-Year-Old Kindergarten program hours will vary from service to service, providing families with between 5 and 15 hours per week.
- Starting a quality kindergarten program at an earlier age leads to positive effects on child development. Kindergarten is a safe place for children to build skills, become more independent, and make friends.
- Use the Starting Age Calculator on the <u>Department of Education's website</u> to enter your child's birth date to find out what year they can start.

Pre-Prep

- Four-Year-Old Kindergarten is becoming Pre-Prep, with programs increasing from 15 to 30 hours each week by full roll-out.
- Pre-Prep offers a longer program in the year before school, which means there will be more time for children to deepen their learning and development.
- Pre-Prep is a play-based learning program led by qualified teachers. Like Four-Year-Old Kindergarten, Pre-Prep will follow the Victorian Early Years Learning and Development Framework.

Pre-Prep – 2026 priority cohort roll-out

- From 2026, between 16 and 25 hours of Pre-Prep will be available statewide to:
 - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children
 - children from a refugee or asylum seeker background
 - children who have had contact with Child Protection services
 - children supported by Early Start Kindergarten or Access to Early Learning in their Three-Year-Old Kindergarten year.
- Children who are currently accessing Early Start Kindergarten at services in 2025 are eligible for Pre-Prep from 2026.
- While all children stand to benefit from the Best Start, Best Life reforms, those who meet the eligibility for the priority cohort roll-out are children that research suggests have the most to gain from expanded programs.

Early Start Kindergarten

- Early Start Kindergarten (ESK) continues to be available for eligible 3-year-old children, providing 15 hours of kindergarten each week.
- To be eligible for ESK, children must be aged 3 by 30 April in the year they start kindergarten, and either:
 - identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander
 - be from a refugee or asylum seeker background, or
 - be from a family that has had contact with Child Protection.
- ESK eligible children can access a 3-year-old group, 4-year-old group, a mixed-age group, or a combination of groups to achieve 15 hours per week.
- It is important that services enrol eligible children in ESK, even if Free Kinder or funded Three-Year-Old Kindergarten is available. This ensures children have priority of access, and services can receive additional funding and support.
- Children who are eligible or have access to ESK in 2025 will be able to access Pre-Prep in 2026.

Koorie Kids Shrine

- Koorie Kids Shine celebrates culture and promotes the benefits of kindergarten for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children aged 3 and 4 can access 15 hours of free kindergarten each week through Early Start Kindergarten.
- Kindergartens work hard to create culturally safe places for Koorie children and families and include Aboriginal perspectives in the learning curriculum and environment.
- At kinder, Koorie kids will learn the skills they need that will help them do well in future years at school, including:
 - build their sense of identity
 - explore how they fit into the world around them
 - learn how to communicate with others
 - strengthen their physical, social and emotional wellbeing
 - feel confident in learning and trying new things.

Registration and enrolment For councils that operate a CRES

- Use the <u>Find a Kinder Program</u> map to find kinder programs that are funded by the Victorian Government in locations near you, including contact details as well as if it is a sessional (standalone) or long day care service.
- A number of services in our local council are also a part of a Central Registration and Enrolment System (CRES). This system makes registering your child easy and fair. You can use one form to register your interest in several kindergarten programs.
- Registrations for 2026 will open on **<insert date>**. Register by **<insert date>** for a first round offer you can continue to register after this date, but registering for a first round offer gives you the best chance of getting a place in your preferred kinder program.
- You can contact us for support with the registration and enrolment process. You will need to prepare documents such as child's birth certificate, immunisation statement, healthcare card, proof of residence (e.g., utilities bill).
- We will send you updates by <email and/or text message> when your child is offered a kindergarten place. We will also advise how many weeks you have to respond to your offer – if you are unhappy with this offer, you can reject it and ask for another offer in the next round.

Registration and enrolment ... continued

- Once you accept your place the kindergarten service will help you enrol your child and prepare you for day one. You will also be contacted for additional information about your child, such as dietary requirements, medical conditions etc.
- The Department of Education works closely with kindergarten providers, including local councils, to understand demand and support access to programs in the local area. This includes applying the <u>Priority of Access (PoA)</u> criteria appropriately when allocating kindergarten places.
- [Delete if not applicable to your council] Following the application of the department's Priority of Access policy, <insert council> also prioritises applications in line with our local criteria at <link>. You can contact our CRES team at <insert email> or <insert phone number> for more information.
- [Delete if not applicable to your council] Note that you will also need to re-register for enrolment for Four-Year-Old Kindergarten or Pre-Prep the following year. Enrolment in Three-Year-Old Kindergarten does not guarantee a place at the same service for your child's second year of kindergarten.

Registration and enrolment ... continued For councils that **do not** operate a CRES

- Use the <u>Find a Kinder Program</u> map to find kinder programs that have been approved by the Victorian Government in locations near you, including contact details as well as if it is a sessional (standalone) kindergarten or long day care service.
- You can contact the service directly using the contact details found on the Find a Kinder Program website and inquire about enrolment.
- The Department of Education works closely with kindergarten providers, including local councils, to understand demand and support access to programs in the local area. This includes applying the <u>Priority of Access (PoA)</u> criteria appropriately when allocating kindergarten places.
- This criteria applies to funded kindergarten places only and supports families to access a kindergarten program that is most suitable for them. This is particularly important for children experiencing vulnerability or disadvantage who may face additional barriers.
- Service providers are required to notify all families of the priority of access policy that applies when they enrol their child. Service providers may also have their own criteria for allocating places.
- Note that you may need to re-enrol for Four-Year-Old Kindergarten or Pre-Prep the following year, and that enrolment in Three-Year-Old Kindergarten does not guarantee a place at the same service for your child's second year of kindergarten. Please confirm this with your service when enrolling your child in Three-Year-Old Kindergarten.
